Admissions Policy for 2021/2022

Approved by Governors: 27th January 2020

Preamble

We seek to be an inclusive school, welcoming children from all backgrounds and abilities and all applications will be treated on merit, and in a sensitive manner. The only restriction we place on entry is that of number. If the number of children applying for entry exceeds the places available, we adopt the procedure set out below to determine whether a child is to be accepted or not. It is our wish for parents to find a place for their child at the school of their choice. However, this is not always possible due to excess demand on the places available.

Core Values

Bishop King School is proud of its heritage as a Church of England Primary School. This Christian tradition influences the ethos of the school in which the children are encouraged to achieve their maximum potential within a caring environment. Children are encouraged to take part in all the activities within the life of the school.

Church School Distinctiveness

We believe our school should inspire dreams and ASPIRATIONS by the help of God, rooted in ACCESS to Him through Jesus and in the Holy Spirit encouraged by every ACHIEVEMENT that He will Grant.

How parents can apply for their child to be admitted to our school

Arrangements for applications for places in Reception to Year 6 at Lincoln Bishop King CE Primary school will be made in accordance with Lincolnshire County Council's co-ordinated admission arrangements; parents resident in Lincolnshire can apply online at www.lincolnshire.gov.uk/schooladmissions, they can also apply by telephone, or ask for a hard copy application form, by telephoning 01522 782030. Parents resident in other areas must apply through their home local authority. Lincoln Bishop King CE Primary school will use the Lincolnshire County Council's timetable published online for these applications and the relevant Local Authority will make the offers of places on their behalf as required by the School Admissions Code.

Lincoln Bishop King CE Primary school provides for the admission of all children in the September following their fourth birthday.

Where we have offered a child a place at our school:

- a) that child is entitled to a full-time place in the September following their fourth birthday;
- b) the child's parents can defer the date their child is admitted to the school until later in the school year but not beyond the point at which they reach compulsory school age and not beyond the beginning of the final term of the school year for which it was made, whichever is the sooner;
- c) where the parents wish, children may attend part-time until later in the school year but not beyond the point at which they reach compulsory school age.

Parents interested in deferring admission or arranging part-time attendance must contact the school to discuss this.

The Admission Authority is the Governing Body.

Our Pupil Admission Number (PAN) is 60.

1. Looked after children and all previously looked after children. Previously looked after children are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted (or became subject to a child arrangements order or special guardianship order).

2. Children living in the ecclesiastical parishes of St Botolph's and St Peter at Gowt's with St Andrew. See a list of streets in appendix 1.
3. Children with a brother or sister already in the school and who will still be attending at the time the place is required.
4. Children whose parents can provide clear evidence of a religious affiliation which will be verified by a signed letter from an officiating minister at the place of worship. This will be assessed using the following criteria:
 - Parents are faithful and regular worshippers at a Christian Church.
 - Parents are practising members of another faith and wish their children to attend a Christian school because of its religious emphasis and ethos.
 - The child is transferring from a church school and parents wish to maintain the continuity of a church school.
5. Distance of the child's home to the school, with those living nearer being accorded the higher priority, which will be decided by Straight line distance as calculated electronically to three figures after the decimal point (eg 1.543 miles) by Lincolnshire County Council school admissions team from the Post Office Address Point of the home to the Post Office Address Point of the school.

If two or more children are tied for the last place a lottery will be drawn by an independent person, not employed by the school or working in Children's Service Directorate at the local authority.

Attendance at the school nursery or Lincoln Central Children's Centre does not confer any priority for admission to the school.

Appeals

The procedures for appeals relating to admissions will be in accordance with all relevant legislation. They are independent and organised by the school and are entirely separate from the admission system. The decision of the independent appeal panel is binding on all parties. Parents wishing to appeal should obtain an appeal form from the school, complete the form and send to the Clerk of the Governors, care of the school.

Admissions appeal timetable

- Parents, carers, or appellants will have 20 school days from the date of notification that their application was unsuccessful, in order to prepare and submit their written appeal.
- Parents, carers, or appellants will receive written notification of the date and arrangements of their hearing, at least 10 school days before the hearing.
- The school will allow reasonable deadlines for appellants to submit additional evidence not submitted with the initial appeal but not exceeding 5 days from the original written appeal. This is to allow for admission authorities to submit their evidence, and for the clerk to send the appeal papers to the panel and parties.
- The school will ensure that the panel clerk sends out the decision letters within 5 school days of the hearing wherever possible.

Bishop King Primary School Admissions Panel will hear appeals submitted on time within the following timescales:

- For applications made in the normal admissions round, appeals will be heard within 40 school days from the deadline for lodging appeals.
- For late applications, appeals will be heard within 40 school days from the deadline for lodging appeals where possible, or within 30 school days of the appeal being submitted.
- For in-year application appeals, the panel will hear appeals within 30 school days of them being submitted.

If the school receives an appeal after the appropriate deadline, the panel will still be arranged to hear the appeal.

Explanations and Definitions:

1. A 'looked after child' is a child who is (a) in the care of a local authority, or (b) being provided with accommodation by a local authority in the exercise of their social services functions (see the definition in Section 22(1) of the Children Act 1989) at the time of making an application to a school.

This includes children who were adopted under the Adoption Act 1976 (see section 12 adoption orders) and children who were adopted under the Adoption and Children Act 2002 (see section 46 adoption orders).

Child arrangements orders are defined in s.8 of the Children Act 1989, as amended by s.12 of the Children and Families Act 2014. Child arrangements orders replace residence orders and any residence order in force prior to 22 April 2014 is deemed to be a child arrangements order.

Section 14A of the Children Act 1989 defines a 'special guardianship order' as an order appointing one or more individuals to be a child's special guardian (or special guardians).

2. Sibling

- A full brother or full sister, whether or not resident in the same household.
- Another child normally resident for the majority of term time in the same household, for whom an adult in the household has parental responsibility as defined in the Children Act 1989 or Section 579 of the 1996 Education Act.

- Twins and other siblings from a multiple birth

In these cases all the children will be considered together as one application. If one or more can be admitted within the published admission number, the school will admit above its admission number as necessary to admit all the children, unless this would make the class too large. The government's school admissions code makes an exception to the infant class limit in this situation.

- Brothers and sisters in the same year group

Where there is only one place available in the school, the children will be considered together as one application. The school will admit above its admission number as necessary to admit all the children except in cases where infant class regulations prevent this from happening. If this happens, the school can legally offer one place because the government's school admission code make no exception to the infant class size limits for siblings in the same year group.

3. Home address This is the address where the child lives for the majority of the school term time with a parent who has parental responsibility as defined in the Children Act 1989 and a parent includes a person who is not a parent but who has responsibility for them. This could include a pupil's guardians but will not usually include other relatives such as grandparents, aunts, uncles etc unless they have all the rights, duties, powers and responsibilities and authority which by law a parent of a child has in relation to the child and their property. Where a child lives normally during the school week with more than one parent at different addresses, the home address for the purposes of school admissions will be that of the parent who lives closest, by straight line distance. Equally, where a family possesses more than one home, the Governors will take as the home address the address where the family and child normally live for the majority of the school term time.

Reserve list

For admission into the intake years the admission authority will keep a waiting list which we call a reserve list. If your child is refused a place at a school your child is automatically put on the reserve list, unless you have been offered a higher preference school. This list is in the order of the oversubscription criteria, as required by the School Admissions Code. This means that names can move down the list if someone moves into the area and is higher placed on the oversubscription criteria. The admission authority must not take account of the time you have been on the list.

For intake years the list is kept by the School Admissions Team until the end of August each year. After this the School Admissions Code requires that admission authorities keep the reserve list until the end of the autumn term, Lincoln Bishop King CE Primary school retains the list until the end of the school year.

Mid-year admissions

The governors will accept admissions into other year groups if there are places. If there are more applications than places then the oversubscription criteria will be used to decide who should be offered the place. If there are no places then you will be told of the independent appeal system.

Fair Access

The school takes part in the Lincolnshire County Council Fair Access protocol.

The government has stated that all Local Authorities must have a Fair Access agreement that allows hard to place children, for example those that have been permanently excluded, to be given a place before any oversubscription criteria are applied and before anyone is considered from the reserve list. Such children are shared out to make sure no one school has to take too many of these children.

The Governors have the right to investigate any concerns it may have with respect to the accuracy of information provided by parents on an application form and to withdraw the offer of a school place if there is evidence that parents have made fraudulent claims, for example concerning parental responsibility or address given.

Admission of children outside their normal age group

Parents may seek a place for their child outside of their normal age group, for example, if the child is gifted and talented or has experienced problems such as ill health.

Parents wishing to make these requests must contact their home local authority for guidance on the procedure to follow.

It is important for parents to note that they will have the opportunity and responsibility to provide whatever evidence they wish to support their request.

Lincoln Bishop King CE Primary School will make decisions on the basis of the circumstances of each case and in the best interests of the child concerned.

This will include taking account of:

- the parent's views;
- any available information about the child's academic, social and emotional development;
- where relevant, their medical history and the views of a medical professional;
- whether they have previously been educated out of their normal age group;
- any evidence that the child may naturally have fallen into a lower age group if it were not for being born prematurely;

- the views of the headteacher.

Children of UK Service Personnel (UK Armed Forces)

In order to meet the government's military covenant aimed at helping UK service personnel, and Crown Servants returning from abroad we have adopted the following arrangements.

For families of service personnel with a confirmed posting to the area, or crown servants returning to live in the area from overseas, the admission authority will:

- Process an application in advance of the family arriving in the area provided the application is accompanied by an official letter that declares a relocation date and a Unit postal address or quartering area address. This address will be used when considering the application against the school's oversubscription criteria.
- Accept a Unit postal address or quartering area address for admissions purposes for a service child.

The admission authority will not refuse a service child a place because the family does not currently live in the area.



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
