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



MYSTERY PICTURE HUNT

- My therapy kids always liked to play this when we had some time after a book or unit.
- Print and laminate the pictures. Cut out the stimuli picture squares.
- Put the squares in a bag or hat.
- Students take turns picking a picture. Tell them to be careful no one sees what it is
- They have to give directions so the others can find the item they picked.
- They cannot name it.
- What they can do depends upon what you are targeting:
 - If they need to give spatial directions, either single or two-step: i.e. It is under the car
 and next to the hamburger, or It is in the lower left corner next to the apple.
 - If they need to describe/define it: i.e. It is something that is made of wool that you wear on your head in the winter.
- Since it isn't a game board there is less pressure to have enough time to "finish." If not
 everyone in the group gets a turn today, keep track of who didn't and start with them next
 time.
- Have fun.








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














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
